

The First Lesson Acts 8:26-40

An angel of the Lord said to Philip, "Get up and go toward the south to the road that goes down from Jerusalem to Gaza." (This is a wilderness road.) So he got up and went. Now there was an Ethiopian eunuch, a court official of the Candace, queen of the Ethiopians, in charge of her entire treasury. He had come to Jerusalem to worship and was returning home; seated in his chariot, he was reading the prophet Isaiah. Then the Spirit said to Philip, "Go over to this chariot and join it." So Philip ran up to it and heard him reading the prophet Isaiah. He asked, "Do you understand what you are reading?" He replied, "How can I, unless someone guides me?" And he invited Philip to get in and sit beside him. Now the passage of the scripture that he was reading was this:

"Like a sheep he was led to the slaughter, and like a lamb silent before its shearer, so he does not open his mouth.

In his humiliation justice was denied him. Who can describe his generation? For his life is taken away from the earth."

The eunuch asked Philip, "About whom, may I ask you, does the prophet say this, about himself or about someone else?" Then Philip began to speak, and starting with this scripture, he proclaimed to him the good news about Jesus. As they were going along the road, they came to some water; and the eunuch said, "Look, here is water! What is to prevent me from being baptized?" He commanded the chariot to stop, and both of them, Philip and the eunuch, went down into the water, and Philip baptized him. When they came up out of the water, the Spirit of the Lord snatched Philip away; the eunuch saw him no more, and went on his way rejoicing. But Philip found himself at Azotus, and as he was passing through the region, he proclaimed the good news to all the towns until he came to Caesarea.

The Second Lesson 1 John 4:7-21


Beloved, let us love one another, because love is from God; everyone who loves is born of God and knows God. Whoever does not love does not know God, for God is love. God's love was revealed among us in this way: God sent his only Son into the world so that we might live through him. In this is love, not that we loved God but that he loved us and sent his Son to be the atoning sacrifice for our sins. Beloved, since God loved us so much, we also ought to love one another. No one has ever seen God; if we love one another, God lives in us, and his love is perfected in us.

By this we know that we abide in him and he in us, because he has given us of his Spirit. And we have seen and do testify that the Father has sent his Son as the Savior of the world. God abides in those who confess that Jesus is the Son of God, and they abide in God. So we have known and believe the love that God has for us.

God is love, and those who abide in love abide in God, and God abides in them. Love has been perfected among us in this: that we may have boldness on the day of judgment, because as he is, so are we in this world. There is no fear in love, but perfect love casts out fear; for fear has to do with punishment, and whoever fears has not reached perfection in love. We love because he first loved us. Those who say, "I love God," and hate their brothers or sisters, are liars; for those who do not love a brother or sister whom they have seen, cannot love God whom they have not seen. The commandment we have from him is this: those who love God must love their brothers and sisters also.






Celebrant

#### **Sanctus and Benedictus**

We give thanks to you, O God, for the goodness and love which you have made known to us in creation; in the calling of Israel to be your people; in your Word spoken through the prophets; and above all in the Word made flesh, Jesus, your Son. For in these last days you sent him to be incarnate from the Virgin Mary, to be the Savior and Redeemer of the world. In him, you have delivered us from evil, and made us worthy to stand before you. We await his coming in glory;


Celebrant And we offer our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving to you, O Lord of all; presenting to you, from your creation, this bread and this wine.

# MUSIC NOTES . I

Ralph Vaughan Williams was a late developer, reaching his mid-thirties before attracting serious attention as a composer. He eventually developed his own unique musical style, which was profoundly influenced by his love of Tudor music and his immensely important work in collecting English folksongs.

In 1908 Vaughan Williams studied with Ravel for a brief three months, and shortly afterwards produced a series of major works, including the song-cycle *On Wenlock Edge*, the *Fantasia on a theme by Thomas Tallis* and, in 1911, the *Sea Symphony* and the *Five Mystical Songs*, the latter a setting of poems by George Herbert (1593 – 1633). Despite his declared atheism, which in later

years mellowed into what his wife Ursula described as "a cheerful agnosticism", Vaughan Williams was inspired throughout his life by much of the liturgy and music of the Anglican church, the language of the King James Bible, and the visionary qualities of religious verse such as Herbert's.

#### **INFANTS, CHILDREN AND YOUTH:**

## **Cry Room**

If you are bringing your infant to church, we have a cry room available if parents feel like a break during mass is needed. The Cry Room is located above the Narthex, the entrance area of the sanctuary. Please ask a greeter if you need help finding it. To be very clear, the clergy and staff of Saint Mark's FULLY welcome little ones in mass and believe God put the wiggle in children—and we love that!

#### Nursery

Available to infants through non-toilet trained toddlers. The nursery (Preschool Red Room) opens at 9:45 am; parents are asked to sign their kids out of the nursery immediately following Mass. The nursery is staffed each week by one of our preschool teachers and a helper, except for the 5th Sunday of the month when we will need parent volunteers. (*To sign up, please email Deacon Susie Fowler: susie@saintmarks.la.*) Parents need to bring diapers & wipes, a comfort toy or blanket, and any bottles/snacks/water/juice that their kids might need.

#### **Preschool and Kindergarten**

Available to toilet trained toddlers through children in Kindergarten. The classroom (Preschool Blue Room) opens at 9:45 am; the children will be brought to their parents in church between the Lord's Prayer and the Agnus Dei, so that families can receive communion or a blessing together. Shelley Weitzel, assisted by Kristin Poon, lovingly teach this age group each week. On the few Sundays that Shelley is not able to be present, parent volunteers will be asked to stand in for her.

# Grades 1 through 5

This age group will gather in the Preschool Yellow Room no earlier than 9:45 am, with the exception of the 2nd Sunday of the month when the kids will meet in the Parish Hall for Children's Chapel & Communion (sorry, parents, but this is for the children only!). On Sundays when there is no Children's Chapel, the children will be brought to their parents in the church between the Peace/Offertory and the Eucharistic Prayer to receive communion or a blessing together. Parent volunteers will be needed to teach and be present with this age group on all Sundays except the 2nd Sunday of the month. To sign up, please email Deacon Susie Fowler: susie@saintmarks.la.

Volunteers Kristine Eller and Kate Mulligan are the Coordinators for this age group—they work together on lesson planning, parent recruitment, and developing occasional special events for kids and their families. Thank you Kristen and Kate!

## Youth (Grades 6 through High School)

Deacon Robert Sammis meets in-person with the youth of our parish on the 1st and 3rd Sundays of each month after the 10 o'clock Mass. Youth gather in the Youth Room (naturally!) at the top of the front office stairs. Keep an eye out for special youth gatherings printed in the bulletin and sent in the E-blast on Fridays.
